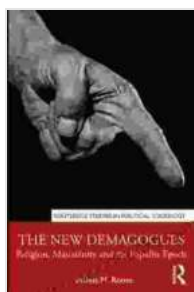

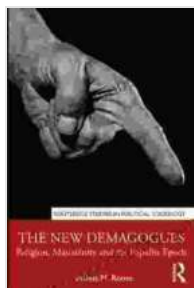
About the Author
